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Rabbi's Corner - THE "WHY" OF JUDAISM

was recently challenged by a student to describe the "why" of Judaism. They wanted to know what drove Jews and Judaism to endure.

In my response, I referred to a story that I have told a number of times over the years at the congregation, but I don't know if I have ever written it down in these pages. When I am pressed to explain the Jewish mission - or the "why" of Judaism - I look to the first three major encounters in the Torah between God and humanity.

In the first encounter—in the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve sinned and were thereby cast out of the Garden. Judaism does not believe in original sin. In fact, we believe that each generation is responsible for their own sins. Sin

> does not get passed down from parent to child. Rather, we are born as blank slates. However, we do recognize that Adam and Eve disobeyed God in the Garden, and we learn that their punishment was to be exiled from the Garden, to have pains in childbirth, to work by the sweat of our brows for food, and to become mortal.

> In this text, humanity was kicked out of the Garden of Eden by God's external punishment. One

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


# Tu B'shevat Seder

can assume that the goal of this divine punishment was to serve as a corrective to humanity. Perhaps if Adam and Eve were punished in this way, word would get around to future generations not to misbehave. In the same way, a parent punishes a child with the hopes that next time, they will know better. In this way, God hoped to cure humanity's propensity to sin.

But then we meet the generation of Noah. That generation was so wicked that God decided to destroy all of humanity - and begin anew with the one noticeably righteous person among the bunch - Noah. And so God chooses Noah to repopulate the Earth. Again, God's hope is that through this punishment, humanity's urge to be sinful would be eradicated. If we repopulate the Earth from one righteous person, then presumably all of humanity will be righteous thereafter. But, God's hope that humanity would become righteous by becoming descendants of Noah only lasted a few generations

Then we come to the generation of Babel. Although this is a cryptic story in the Torah, we do know that the generation of Babel began building a tower that reached up into the heavens. This upset God who punished humanity by dispersing us to the corners of the earth and causing us to speak different languages. Here again, the hope was that this external punishment would be a behavioral corrective for humanity.

It was at this point, after three unfortunate encounters with humanity, I argue that God decided to change tactics. Instead of punishing humanity every time they sinned - and hoping for better behavior moving forward, God decided instead to use teachers. A parent can punish a child over and over again — in the hopes that they will learn right from wrong through this process. But the best way to teach right from wrong is to model good behavior. Enter Abraham.


While we do not know much about Abraham's childhood from the text directly, we do know that he was chosen by God with one job - to be a role model of ethical monotheism to all of humanity. Abraham and his descendants—us—were charged with the job of being holy exemplars, a light unto the nations.

It is through our concept of covenant and commitment to righteous behavior that other nations of the earth will learn right from wrong. That is a tall order to place on one specific family, but that is exactly what Abraham agreed to. So did his children - and all generations of Jews through today. And to be clear, we are not always good at it. Individual Jews and the wider Jewish community often fall short of the goal of being holy exemplars. That is the struggle in our job. Call it an occupational hazard. But we are corrected in our bad behavior by the ethical urgings of our prophets, the progressive writings of our sages, and the values of love and learning and family found in our community. And that struggle to be righteous and holy through mitzvot and good deeds is the model of good behavior that each generation needs to observe.

So when I am asked about the "why" of Judaism, or the point of the Jewish mission, I refer to this midrash - that the Jewish people were chosen by God to help all humanity become more holy. Because ultimately, that is God's desire. Instead of punishing us directly—like God did in the Garden, or in Noah's generation, or at Babel, God left it up to our family - and our extended family of monotheistic faiths - to promote holiness through our actions. This is what drives me personally. And through partnership with other lights of humanity, may we continually be a reminder to humanity to choose good over evil, to choose holiness over despair.

In April 2017, Congregation Beth El will celebrate 130 years since our charter in 1887. For the next few months, we will be including clips from our congregational history in the bulletin to celebrate our upcoming anniversary.

#### **RABBI FABER**

[In 1900], the Reverend Dr. Maurice Faber was engaged as full-time Rabbi at a salary of \$1,200.00 per annum. He came from Keokuk, Iowa and stayed for 34 years, until his death in 1934. Born in Hungary and European-educated, he had profound learning, and a new spirit of humanism and tolerance blew into Tyler with him. Deeply convinced of the validity of Reform Judaism for his time, he had broken with the Orthodoxy of his childhood - so much so that his father disinherited him for this unfilial act of rebellion.

These early years were filled with ideological struggles between the two different sections of the congregation. An entry for July 7, 1895, in one of the earliest extant minute books, states: An amendment to the By Laws was proposed and carried, as follows: "The services of the congregation shall be conducted during the holidays (Yom Kippur and Rosh Hashanah) in conformity with the Minhag Yastrow (the Orthodox prayerbook), the balance of the year with the Hebrew Union Prayerbook."

A further striking example of the Orthodox leanings of this Reform Congregation in its early history is another excerpt from this early constitution: "No applicant shall be qualified for membership who is...united in marriage contrary to the ordinances of the Jewish religion and any member marrying out of the pale of Judaism shall thereby forfeit his membership."

Only a few years later, in 1902, after two years of the stewardship of the redoubtable Dr. Faber the by-laws read "that any Israelite who is honorable shall have the right to join this congregation - and that all services, weekly and High Holidays shall be conducted in accordance with the rites of the Hebrew Union Prayer Book."
